Rector writes

Some of you will already know that I am going to be a grandma soon! My daughter Esther and her husband Mat are expecting a baby girl this summer and Andrew and I are very excited at the prospect of becoming grandparents. The only thing is... I can't remember how I came to be this old... and when did my little girl grow up? The years have simply flown by. When my granddaughter is born, it will be a very different world from the one I knew as a child. We might bemoan how things have changed as we struggle with new technology... everything seems to be so much more complicated these days... but some things have changed for the better - particularly in the life of the church.

Over the past couple of weeks, we have celebrated several appointments of female clergy: Rev Alison Mathew has been instituted as the Rector of St Oswald's Kings Park and St Aidan's Clarkston; Rev Dawn Matthew has been appointed as the Diocesan Canon Missioner and Rev Dr Elizabeth Sreakey who is Rural Dean has been installed as a Canon of St Mary's Cathedral. The Diocese of Edinburgh has appointed the Rt Revd Dr Dagmar Winter as their next bishop and on 25 March the Rt Revd and Rt Hon Dame Sarah Mullally will be enthroned as the 106th Archbishop of Canterbury - the first ever female Archbishop of Canterbury!

When I was a child, I remember my indignation when I realised I was not allowed to audition for Durham Cathedral choir, as my brother did, because I was a girl. As I grew up and began to explore the possibility of ministry in the church, my options were restricted because of my gender. When I was selected to train for ministry back in 1990, it was to serve as a deacon. The church had yet to agree that women could be priests. That finally changed in 1992 with an historic vote in the General Synod of the C of E. However, I vividly remember how the Principle of our Theological College asked those of us who were in favour of the vote not to celebrate the result too loudly, out of courtesy for those who were left devastated by the outcome!

I am mindful that the church still has a long way to go before it is truly inclusive of everyone, but I and my female colleagues are evidence that change is possible.

I will be watching the Enthronement Service on 25 March, and I will be celebrating an event that I could never have believed possible 36 years ago.

I wonder what further changes my granddaughter will witness in the years to come? We know that with God, nothing is impossible!

Lent Groups

This year you have a choice of two Lent groups! On Friday evenings at 7pm I am hosting a group at the Rectory. We are following a course designed by Rev Rachel Mann called "From Now On" which takes as its starting point the film "The Greatest Showman". Rachel was formerly Poet-in-Residence at Manchester Cathedral. The course explores ways in which themes of faith, hope and redemption run through our lives. It examines how each of us – like P.T. Barnum and the members of his Circus – face and can overcome doubt, temptation and prejudice.

On Saturday mornings from 10.30-11.30am I am leading a prayer walk around our neighbourhoods. The idea behind a prayer walk is to pray intentionally for those who live and work in the locality, stopping at various locations such as schools, places of worship, and medical centres. It is amazing how much you notice when you are walking around. I have learnt so much about the history of different buildings from those who have lived in the area for a long time. There's no need to commit yourself to coming every Saturday... just come if you are free. We set off from St Ninian's church each time.

The Biblical character I'd most like to meet: the rich young man

There are some characters in the Bible whom you want to meet just to ask them "And what happened next?"

One of those characters, for me, is the rich young man whom we encounter in Mark 10, Matthew 19, and Luke 18. He's presented to us quite sympathetically: rich, to be sure; but we're given no doubt he's sincere when he says he has kept the commandments – and we notice that he doesn't boast about this, but only offers the information when he's



challenged. Luke describes him as a "ruler": the implication seems to be that, young as he is, he has some responsible role in his community. Maybe we should see him as a kind of Darcy in Judea, perhaps a little too aware of his status, but managing his estate and treating his dependents conscientiously. And, however much his status matters to him, it doesn't stop him falling on his knees and asking Jesus "What must I do?" This isn't a Dives from the parable that Luke tells, just a chapter or so earlier, lounging around in gluttony and waste. Jesus, Mark tells us, looked at him, and loved him.

Loved him, and then promptly issued a command so unexpectedly severe that even His disciples were staggered. "Sell everything you have." And the young man went away sad, and we don't know what happened next.

The story's come down to us because of that command and the image that expands on it: the camel trying to fit through the eye of a needle. But we can't believe that Jesus treated the young man so harshly just to turn him into a teaching aid. A little later, He would praise Zacchaeus for giving *half* his possessions to the poor. What Jesus said must have been not only a truth in general but also what that young man needed to be told; and He did not set tasks that were impossible.

If he managed to obey Jesus, what we'd expect to hear of him afterward is nothing. From someone at the centre of local affairs, commanding servants and dispensing alms, to a nobody; a face among many, maybe, in the crowd at the Entry to Jerusalem. Perhaps, years later, he was a poor member of the first congregation in Jerusalem or in Jericho, smiling wryly when he heard his own tale retold, but never letting anyone discover that once he had been the rich young man of the story.

Maybe, if I could speak to him, he would answer my question with "But that's not the point."

Christian Solidarity Worldwide

In the first week in March we are asked to pray for China. One human right defender, Zhang Zhan, was sentenced to four years in prison for 'picking quarrels and provoking trouble'. This is the second time she has been in prison for such matters. She goes on hunger strike and has been force fed often and so suffers mentally, spiritually and physically. In October a number of members of the Zion church were formally arrested and have not been released. The UN report in 2022 noted the serious human rights violations by China against especially the Uyghurs but there has been no improvement. China pursues Chinese nationals abroad and returns North Koreans to that land knowing that imprisonment and torture are almost certainly awaiting them.

In Week 2, we are asked to pray for Mexico - for women discriminated against for ethnic, gender and linguistic differences, for Protestants being displaced and driven from their villages, for clergy at risk of murder, and the lack of follow-up in the press to seek those who have carried such out.

Week 3 is when India is the focus. Anti-conversion laws are in existence in many states in India, and in others such laws are being strengthened, and Christians and Muslims are targeted, using these laws. Christian families

are attacked and driven from their homes, or missionaries attacked in Jammu and Kashmir. Dalits who become Christian are doubly vulnerable since they are the lowest caste also.

Week 4 focuses of North Korea. The government seems to be gaining support from young people by spreading lies and cracking down on any foreign media. It is very difficult to get information of true facts into the country. Huge sums of money are spent on arms while very many are very hungry and even starving. Escaping from North Korea means crossing into China which is not sympathetic to them and sends them back.

Week 5 takes us into April. As we think of Christ's Passion through this Holy Week we are asked to pray especially for one group of suffering Christians. You might choose to think of some of the above examples or to look at the CSW website for others.

Week 6, 5-11 April, brings Nigeria back into the spotlight. We pray that Christians will be able to celebrate Easter without suffering. So many in that land are not free because they have been unjustly imprisoned, or abducted for ransom, forced into marriage or slavery. We pray for their release.

I do not yet have the prayer diary for the rest of April but some of the following facts will help your prayer.

1. Over 220 abuses of religious freedom were reported in Nicaragua in 2024 to CSW, involving multiple breaches and thousands of people.
2. Y Quynh Bdap, a Christian and human rights defender from Vietnam but accepted as a refugee in Thailand, was detained there and sent back to Vietnam after more than a year in prison. His whereabouts are not known at present. He had been founder member of an organisation to fight non-violently for the Montagnard minority ethnic group.
3. In 2024 in Sri Lanka there were 43 incidents of religious violence and intolerance.
4. Only six religions are recognised in Indonesia – Buddhism, Catholicism, Confucianism, Hinduism, Islam and Protestantism. All others have no legal security and face exclusion. The Ahmadiyya

community has been in Indonesia since 1925 and has over 500,000 Adherents, but they are seen as heretics by the majority Sunni Muslims, and since 2005 have suffered serious violations of freedom of belief, including violence.

The World Day of Prayer

The World Day of Prayer, observed on the first Friday in March each year, is a worldwide movement of informed prayer involving people of many denominations and languages in more than 170 countries. Each year the service is written by women in a different country who share the hopes and fears, joys and sorrows, opportunities and needs, of their country. It affirms that informed prayer and prayerful action are inseparable.

This year's World Day of Prayer service has been designed by a group of ecumenical Christian Nigerian women in response to the theme, "I



Will Give You Rest: Come" (Matthew 11:28-30). They reflected collectively on this theme from the context of their experiences as Nigerian Christian women. They hope to inspire other women in the world to unite and pray as one people.

"As we trust God, our Burden Bearer, we become one body in Christ, receiving and bringing rest to the world."

This year we are joining in the service at Queen's Park Govanhill Parish Church. The service begins at 2pm on Friday 6 March - everyone is welcome!

An 'Orkney' saint: Tredwell or Triduana

Many of you will know of the story of St Magnus of Orkney and of the magnificent cathedral dedicated to him. Orkney, though like many other parts of Britain, has other saints associated with it, some with links to other areas of Scotland. There are the ruins of a chapel dedicated to St Tredwell near a loch also associated with her on Papay, Papa Westray.



From at least 1700 there are texts referring to the ancient worship associated with her, and to the healing powers linked to her. A presbyterian cleric complained that even after the Reformation the locals went to pray at her chapel before coming to Sunday worship. As far as can be Determined, she lived sometime in the period between 4th and 8th century AD, possibly nearer the later date. The Orkney

version suggests that she was local, refused to marry a man called Nechtan and tore her eyes out to have him reject her. She is particularly thought to have healed many with eye complaints, including blindness. The main place in Scotland associated with her is at Restalrig in Edinburgh where there are the remains of a building with a pond linked to her and her healing powers. The version of the story there is that Nechtan was a Pictish king. Other stories have her coming to Scotland with St Rule or Regulus, who is said to have brought St Andrew's bones to Scotland, or that she came from the Forfar area. On Papay there is a chapel dedicated to St Boniface, one of at least two such saints, who travelled from Europe, and there may be a link between Boniface and Tredwell. There are other versions of the spelling of her name. Some of these traditions go a long way back before there were any written records. Other 'Orkney' Saints may be noted in future magazines.
